"The Hidden Joys of Serving"

Making a difference in any place begins with an understanding. Many of us are coming together for a basic principle; Some of these being to serve our lord, the community, a job placement, or even for the simple fact that you enjoy knowing that you make an immediate difference. Volunteering my time for those that need what my congregation has to offer, but also brings me a sense of joy and fulfillment. This inspires my passion of food and cooking; while being able to help the less fortunate. By either with the act of cooking something warm, spending a moment playing a game of cards, or having a movie night with them can really make a difference. Many times, the general idea is you could do is donate money; however, that is merely the beginning. By working with a few local organizations: Operation Warmheart, Food For Friends, or the Community Foodbank of New Jersey; I have found ways to outsource my skills and network my way into giving back to my community. The open service of Operation Warmheart, we at Zion Lutheran Church of Rahway open up our social hall; Our guests brought to us by the Elizabeth Homeless Coalition for 18 weeks. Once a week these people have somewhere warm to sleep. Every Wednesday night, either a fellow congregation member or myself cook a nice hearty meal, then we watch movies/spend time with them, help set up their cots to sleep, and lastly, in the morning we prepare them a nutritious breakfast/send them off with a bagged lunch and other necessities. As I volunteer my time with the Food for Friends which tethered to the Hillside Food bank academy attended, it's a more of the behind the scenes. I help make bags to distribute to the homeless/low income families, transport the donated food within our pantries, and then hand out the things we have to spare. Also, at another local church in the area, Food for Friends has a soup kitchen once a week. I still try to go as much as possible with my children so they can appreciate what God continues to bless us with every week, and so they can spend time with the less fortunate. Sometimes a good, genuine conversation or a lively joke can go a long way. Another way I have found to continue my ministry is at the Community Foodbank of New Jersey, located in Hillside. At their facility you can volunteer your time there and do so much! From sorting the donated food, bagging school lunches/snacks for children in our surrounding public schools, to collecting/distributing clothing items.

I strongly urge everyone to get involved and to volunteer their time, even if it's only for two hours on the weekend at this food bank. It doesn't matter your age, race, or religious/political views - there are starving people out there, right there in your home towns. If I, a single mother of three, a middle-class citizen can get up and help those who really need it, then imagine what all of us could do.

Many of us have trouble getting physically up and taking that first firm step, so there needs to be a will for it.

Just this past year I was able to accomplish a lot not only for myself, but for my church, and the homeless community. Over the past Three winter servicing Operation Warmheart the project has grown exponentially thanks to everyone involved, and of course, our Lord. Then over the summertime I attended and graduated within the top of my class from the culinary program at the Food Academy which is also ran inside the Community Foodbank of New Jersey.

I believe helping the less fortunate became a passion of mine right from a youthful age. From watching my household live poorly, to always wanting to rescue animals. I have been told that i have strong rescue dynamics. However the calling to cook for a nonprofit organization really happened full circle; very first dinner that I volunteered for our Operation Warmheart. As Pastor Carmine prayed over our first dinner, I just felt the spirit telling me I was in the right place, doing a great thing. Even though preparation from week to week can be overwhelming, I shelter/feed fifteen- twenty people; these are the moments I am glad God allows me to be brought together by our wonderful staff.

This was my first year over-seeing and organizing this shelter in its entirety. As strong of a woman I am: it stands without the help of my family and congregation; I would not be able to provide a haven for these people.

My name is Penelope L. Bera; This is who I am and this is what I do. Hopefully this has inspired you.

Rev. Michael A. Saporito

Michael was born in Newark, New Jersey and raised in Bloomfield. He has served the Catholic Church as a priest and pastor for 24 years. As a graduate of Rutgers University, he obtained his Bachelors of Arts Degree in Accounting and worked for a New Jersey based accounting firm for three years.

Having had a major spiritual experience in his late high school years, Michael started contemplating a call to serve the Church only after he had begun to work as an accountant. He studied at Immaculate Conception Seminary at Seton Hall University and graduated with a Masters in Divinity in 1992. Fr. Michael was ordained a priest for the Archdiocese of Newark, which covers Bergen, Hudson, Essex and Union Counties in New Jersey at Sacred Heart Cathedral Basilica in Newark.

He has served at several churches as an assistant: St. Joseph Church, West Orange; St. Peter the Apostle Church, River Edge; Our Lady of the Visitation Church, Paramus; and St. Elizabeth Church, Wyckoff. Fr. Michael was named the pastor of St. Joseph Church in Maplewood, a position he held for seven years, when he was appointed as pastor of St. Helen Church, his current assignment since February of 2011. St. Helen is a community of over 4000 households.

Fr. Michael has a passion for helping others to deepen their faith in Christ, especially those who think that the life of faith is not for them or who are seekers looking to explore the faith. In addition to his parish work, he serves as a member of the Evangelization Commission of the Archdiocese, as well as the Presbyteral Council, which is a body of priests that consults with the Archbishop. He also serves on the College of Consultors, a body of lay men, women and religious who approve construction and repair projects for other churches within the Archdiocese.

He also serves on the Board of Directors for ChristLife, which is a Catholic Evangelization Ministry that is spreading across the country inviting people into deeper faith life.

Fr. Michael is excited to be joining with the UCICC group to work together with people of varied faith backgrounds, to grow and learn from them and to offer assistance to those who are forgotten.

Fr. Michael is an avid sports fan especially baseball (New York Mets) and football (New York Giants); and his family: two brothers, two sisters-in-law and five nieces are the joy of his life! His parents and dear sister have gone to their eternal rest.

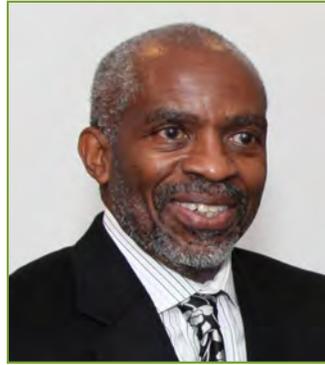

“FAITH IN ACTION” MARCH 31, 2016

Union County Interfaith Coordinating Council holds "speed dating" event

The Union County Interfaith Coordinating Council recently held a "speed dating" event at Suburban Golf Club in Union to allow its member congregations to interact with people with disabilities and at-risk youth who are not currently associated with a religious community, telling them about their faiths and organizations and offering them the opportunity to join.

The first-of-its-kind event – called Faith into Action – allowed members of Community Access Unlimited (CAU) and people from the community who are not currently affiliated with a house of worship to meet with representatives of more than 20 churches, synagogues, mosques and temples to determine if they might be a good fit for them, according to Sid Blanchard, CAU executive director. More than 90 CAU members attended and there were more than 50 "matches," he added.

CAU is a statewide Elizabeth-based nonprofit providing support programs and services to adults with disabilities as well as youth served under the Department of Children and Families (DCF) to enable them to live independently in the community, in areas including housing, vocational skills and life-skills training, education, advocacy and recreation.

The Union County Interfaith Coordinating Council, is an organization comprising more than 40 interfaith congregations and community-based nonprofits, including CAU. The council promotes inclusion of all people within the community, without regard to race, religion or disability, and creates a clearing house of faith-based, nonprofit and government community services available to the public, according to Blanchard.

"Some of our members have long been disconnected from any organized religion," Blanchard said. "In fact, in the past some have been bullied and shunned and made to feel unwelcome. Our mission is to enable our members to live fully integrated lives within the community and for many people an affiliation with a religion and a house of worship is an important part of community. We wanted to create an atmosphere that would facilitate that."

Carmine Pernini, pastor of the Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church in Rahway and coordinator of the Interfaith Council, said houses of worship often are homogeneous communities that may feel less than welcoming to newcomers, especially those who are perceived as different, which runs counter to the natural message of inclusion that should be the foundation of all religious communities.

"There is a difference between saying all are welcome and welcoming people as long as they behave the way we want them to behave," he said. "It's really about welcoming people and adapting ourselves to who they are. When you have a new person enter a religious community everything changes anyway. Each person brings their own personality and experiences and that's a good thing."

Beverly Williams, a CAU member with disabilities, attended the event because she had a bad experience with one religion when she was younger – she said she was asked to leave – and now attends a local Evangelical church but does not feel part of their community.



"I learned a lot," she said. "I learned they all talk about the same God and we all come into the world the same way and we go to the same place. I enjoyed learning about the different religions."

Asia Lee, a youth member of CAU, said she found the event informative and thought-provoking. Lee does not attend any church but now thinks she may start attending a Lutheran church.

"I'm not really a big religious person," she said. "But I'm open minded. I learned a lot about each religion and it helped me make a decision on which religion to choose."

Transitional Opportunities Program

The Transitional Opportunities Program (TOP) provides a variety of support services to youth aged 13 - 21. Youth living in any county of New Jersey are eligible to enter the program through a referral by CSOC, DCP&P, or by a self-referral. While living in Elizabeth, youth receive a variety of independent living training and transitional living support services until they achieve the life skills needed to live independently.

At Community Access Unlimited, TOP hosts several events/workshops available to the youth in the community.
