OUR MISSION

*The **Union County Youth Services Steering Committee** is committed to increasing the number, availability, and accessibility of youth services to youth and young adults, and works to ensure that Union County's youth/young adults know how to secure the resources they need to develop and realize their potential for productive, self-sufficient lives as adults.*

Members of the Steering Committee represent public and non-profit youth-serving agencies, child advocates, volunteers, and faith-based organizations. They meet regularly to share information and resources, identify and close any major gaps in youth service programs, and to disseminate found resources through websites, media announcements, public forums and an annual conference.

GOALS

- ∞ Serve as a vehicle for fostering communication and networking among youth services providers and youth consumers
- ∞ Improve youth service effectiveness and outcomes.
- ∞ Share information, resources and expertise among providers and youth and parent consumers.
- ∞ Improve coordination of and access to services by youth and parents.
- ∞ Encourage development of an integrated youth and young adult services system.
- ∞ Improve utilization of existing youth resources and promote development of new services.
- ∞ Foster cross systems coordination, encourage collaborations and build linkages among youth service providers and resources.
- ∞ Stimulate use of innovative and evidence-based practice models through research projects and pilot demonstrations.
- ∞ Provide training and educational opportunities for staff working with youth and young adults.
- ∞ Develop and share standardized outcomes, performance measures and evaluation tools.

RESULTS

- ∞ The establishment of a strong county-wide foundation within the Union County Youth Services Steering Committee
- ∞ An annual Union County Youth Services Networking Conference that happens in October.
- ∞ Creation of a network that conducts and shares meetings and forums to share information, resources, and services for youth and young adults
- ∞ The development of the **Union County Youth Directory**, a computerized public database rich with resources for youth and service providers
- ∞ A group of strong advocates interested in participating in public information and awareness campaigns to encourage additional youth service groups to join in the cause.

MEET THE LEADERSHIP TEAM



SID BLANCHARD is the founder and executive director of Community Access Unlimited. CAU began in 1979 with a \$90,000 grant to move 20 individuals out of institutions to community living and has grown the agency to no support over 6000 people throughout the state in areas of housing, support services, vocational supports, recreation, money management, advocacy, and more. Services in the home are provided to anyone in need including at-risk youth and adults with developmental disabilities, seniors and veterans.

In the most recent years, Sid has created more opportunities for increased community integration – starting three councils to join the interfaith community, youth services, and non-profit leaders with the common goal to bring upon community wide benefits together.

Sidney is a pioneer, leader, and ardent advocate in providing community supports for people in need. He is active in both local and national level organizations that further initiatives for individuals with special needs.



TANYA JOHNSON began her career as a childcare worker at the Berea Children's Home in Berea, Ohio. After 14 years in the Ohio social service world, she decided to make a change. After relocating to the tri-state area in 1998, Tanya began her career at Community Access Unlimited as a coordinator. Tanya worked her way through the ranks at CAU to become the Senior Assistant Executive Director of youth services in 2008.

Tanya has a passion for working with youth to help them grow into young productive adults. Through her passion Tanya has worked with aging out youth, runaway homeless youth and community based youth who have been successful in transitioning to adulthood.



NICHOLAS R. SCALERA has over 40 years' experience in youth and family services management. He was State Director of the NJ Division of Youth and Family Services (DYFS) from 1989-94 and DYFS Assistant Director from 1972-89. Previously, Nick worked as a public information officer for the NJ Department of Community Affairs (1967-72) and NJ Office of Economic Opportunity (1966-67) and was a reporter for the *Associated Press* (1966) and *Newark News* (1964-66).

In 1995, Nick formed Scalera Consulting Services, which works with public and private agencies that serve at-risk youth and/or vulnerable adults.

Scalera holds a BA in Social Studies from Seton Hall University and an MS in Journalism "Cum Laude" from Columbia University. In 2007, he established the Nicholas R. Scalera Scholarship Fund at Seton Hall University to help academically qualified students with substantial financial and social needs secure a college education.

Nick has received many honors, including: Humanitarian Award from Seton Hall University; Public Administrator of the Year from the New Jersey Chapter, American Society for Public Administration (ASPA); Man of Achievement Award for services to at-risk youth from Phi Kappa Theta National Fraternity; and Humanitarian of the Year from the Association for Advancement of the Mentally Handicapped (predecessor of Community Access Unlimited, Inc.).

Transitional Living Program



“Promoting Recovery, Stability, and Well-Being”

The Transitional Living Program provides supports to youth in achieving housing stability, education and employment, permanent family/community connections and social and emotional well-being.

Services include:

- 24-hour assistance for female youths ages 16 up to but excluding 22
- Gateway services including food, drink, clothing and hygienic supplies
- Intake and needs assessments
- Safe transitional housing accommodations and nutritious daily meals
- Case management
- Individual and group life skills, social skills and counseling services
- Educational and employment assistance
- Linkages to a full complement of services within CAU and the local continuum of care
- Connection to permanent housing
- Aftercare follow-up

Referrals may be made by:

- Teachers, school social workers and school administration
- Social services agencies
- Law enforcement/juvenile justice
- Community provider organizations
- Families, friends and peers
- Good neighbors
- Safe Place participants
- Youth self-referral

Academic & Career Exploration to Success Program (ACES)



Coaching youth to pursue independence through education, personal development, relationship building, and extended support.

Program Description:

The ACES Program works to prepare youth ages 16-21 located in Essex and Union County for college and/or employment.

Youth in the program complete an initial assessment with an ACES Coach that builds their individualized service plan. Using the member's service plan as a guide of their individual goals, an ACES Coach may assist the youth by:

- Coordinating pre-requisite and preparatory courses and testing (such as GED, PSAT, SAT, AT, and Accuplacer exams) as identified for each youth
- Arranging college visits, tours, and interviews
- Helping youth connect to financial aid, grants and work-study possibilities and scholarships (where applicable)
- Educating youth on all accommodations in post-secondary educational institutions
- Providing linkages to college retention programs

To above and beyond enrich the lives of youth as they pursue independence, CAU will provide supports that:

- Make meaningful social connections, positive and productive decision making, and critical thinking
- Teach self-advocacy and empower youth to seek services available to them
- Encourage civil engagement
- Prepare youth for employment or provide youth with job readiness skills and work experience



Services are provided 7 days a week from 9:00 AM - 8:00 PM to provide maximum flexibility and access to services based on varying youth scheduling needs.

Referrals to the ACES Program must be made by the Department of Children & Families, Division of Child Protection & Permanency for Essex and Union Counties.

CAU's community service mission includes providing direct services to people in need as well as information on how to locate services provided by other agencies.

This month we highlight **three CAU services available to qualified recipients** in our Union County communities.

1] **Free home delivered meals** [6 week program; one meal per person per day] for Union County residents who are US citizens and their families who need food and who are:

*Age 59 or younger [head of household];

*Living in low income households;

* Unable to access adequate food for themselves and their families.

* Documents and interview are required to qualify.

2] **Homemaker-home health aide personal care assistance** in home for persons who require help to live independently at home. Services are provided at \$20/hour but may be free for those who are low income and age 60 or over, or any age with a disability. Services include light housekeeping, meal preparation, errands and personal care assistance.

3] **Home and property care services** are offered at reasonable fees to assist home bound residents with yard and lawn care, leaf and snow removal, deep cleaning and clutter removal, home maintenance, handyman repairs and home improvements. There are no age or income requirements for these services and costs are based on which services and projects are selected. **Contact Bill Webb X 4206.**



TOP'S Open House 2018


